over 200,000 local jobs/\$40B in maritime int'l trade











Inequities in the Duwamish Valley


Our community experiences historic inequities and discriminatory practices:

2013 Cumulative Health Impact Analysis





Port Community Action Team

The Duwamish Valley PCAT is a group of neighbors from Georgetown and South Park who are collaborating with the Port of Seattle to remedy their historical and current disproportionate, cumulative impacts to the environment and its people.

To further our goals of a healthy, sustainable community, we are creating a Community Benefits Commitment with the Port based on the principles of equity, anti-displacement, and empowerment.

Our agreement will focus on principles of environmental justice by promoting a clean environment, increasing economic opportunities, and building community capacity.




